Foreword

Raha College provides the ideal ambience for students having a desire to pursue higher education in Three-year Degree course in the streams of Arts, Science and Commerce. The College introduced Science and Commerce stream from the academic session 2016-17. Set amidst the meadows and lush green foliage of resplendent trees, in a serene atmosphere within the town, the College offers an ideal location for teaching-learning ambits. It is located at a distance of one and half K.M. from Raha town Natun Chariali and can be approached from three main roads. It is only at a distance of 400 meter from the junction of NH-37 road toward Chaparmukh Railway junction. This seat of higher learning is preparing to celebrated its Diamond Jubilee this year. The College was accredited "B" grade in its third cycle of NAAC quality assessment in October 2023. The College has two distance education centers at present functioning under Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University, offering BA and MA programmes, and Assam State Open School (ASOS) offering Higher Secondary level course in Arts stream.

The dream of setting up a seat of higher learning was achieved through the endeavor, zeal and aspiration of some far-sighted and enlightened social activists of greater Raha area, and it turned into a reality with the establishment of the College on 28th July 1964. Till date, Raha College is the only general degree college in Raha Legislative Assembly Constituency reserved for Scheduled Caste. The College is permanently affiliated to Gauhati University. Apart from the regular degree course, the College also runs the HS course in Arts as per AHSEC curriculum. The College has rich faculty members, a modern library and a Computer Centre. It is worth mentioning that the teaching-learning process has received a fillip with the introduction of state of art digital class rooms constructed with the financial assistance received from the Govt. of Assam. Under RUSA Grant, new infrastructure like the new academic building, renovated acoustic auditorium, cycle stand, Science laboratory, renovated classrooms, etc, have been set up.

Goals and Objectives of the College

Raha College started its mission with zeal to promote higher education to the largely underdeveloped people of Raha locality since its inception in 1964. The mission of the College is to serve the rural youths by providing them with easy access to higher education and job opportunities. The College will strive towards integrated personality, growth of rural students in particular and students at large in which special attention is given to their intellectual, moral and cultural development. Another important objective of the College is to inculcate the spirit of inquisitiveness among the students and to instill in them the spirit of patriotism, dedication and humanistic values.

Vision

The vision of the College is to make it a seat of excellence and to uplift the living standards of the rural youths by imparting them higher education and fostering an enduring sense of discipline and single-minded dedication to their work.

INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

The college is endowed with excellent physical infrastructural facilities to support the teaching—learning process. The main campus is spread over 6.48 acres. The college has a spacious seminar/conference hall. There are adequate numbers of classrooms, separate departments, and separate departmental class rooms to facilitate the academic programmes. The infrastructure involves spacious class rooms, proper lighting and ventilation, seating arrangement with proper visibility for both students and teachers. There are common rooms for boys and girls separately. There is a special arrangement for canteen for students and staff, and there is an auditorium cum indoor stadium. The college has hostel facility for boys and a girl's hostel is being constructed. The details of the facilities available with the institution are as under.

- 1. **Technology Enabled Learning Facility:** The College has eight ICT Classrooms where the provision of multimedia Projectors, Multimedia Learning, Wi-Fi Connectivity is available. A new computer lab with 25 computers has been set up. The institute has set up a 25KVA eco-friendly silent generator for power backup to the campus during electric failure.
- 2. **Conference Hall**: The College has one modern conference hall and it is regularly used for conducting meetings, group discussions, etc.
- 3. **Seminar Hall:** The College has two seminar hall with a seating capacity of 100 and 50 respectively. Seminar halls are equipped with LCD screen and multimedia projector.
- 4. Laboratories: The College has two laboratories in the Arts stream, one in Education department and the other in Geography department for conduct of practical classes during the session and in annual examination. New modern Science laboratories in all the science subjects available in our college have been set up. The college received funds from RUSA for construction of science laboratories.
- 5. Library Facility: Raha College Central library has more than 28,000 books which include text books, reference books, journals; magazines etc. The library remains open on all working days from 9.00 AM to 4.00 PM. Photostat facility is available at a nominal rate for students of the college. A student is provided with a card with the facility to borrow two books at a time for 15 days. A major or honors student gets the privilege for borrowing 4 books at a time. Students are to follow library rules. State of the art Digital Library is another important feature of the library
- 6. **Hostel Facility**: The College has one Boy's Hostel and Girls' Hostel within the college Campus. The number of seats available in the Boys Hostel is 18 and in the Girl's Hostel is 22. Hostel seats are allotted at the time of admission on the basis of merit.
- 7. Canteen Facility: The College has a canteen in the campus. Students can have refreshment in the canteen during the college hour.
- 8. Sports Facility: The College has always created a niche for itself in the field of sports. In sports, the college provides indoor and outdoor games.
- 9. Outdoor Games: A Spacious 2 acre play ground is available for outdoor games i.e., cricket, football, athletics etc. in the college campus. There are separate volleyball and badminton courts in the campus. A practicing ground with nets for cricketers has been set up separately.

- 10. Indoor Games: Facilities for sports like Table Tennis, Chess, multi-gym, Carom, etc, are available to students. Gym facilities for both students and staff are available in tune with the Fit India initiative.
- 11. Auditorium cum Indoor Stadium: The College has a modern and state of art acoustic auditorium. The seating capacity of the auditorium is around 600.
- 12. Class Rooms: All the departments have their individual classrooms for taking major/honors classes. Besides, there are sufficient classrooms, some of them renovated recently through RUSA funds to facilitate students in their learning.
- 13. Departmental Rooms: The departments have been provided with individual rooms so that teachers can plan their classes and other related educational and co-curricular activities.
- 14. **Disabled friendly, barrier free environment:** There is ramp provision with built environment and one disabled –friendly washroom in the campus.
- 15. **CCTV Surveillance:** The college campus and hostel are secured by 24x7 CCTV surveillance.
- 16. Girls' Common Room: The College has a facility of girls' common room with a seating capacity of 80 students. The common room has attached toilet with sanitary napkin unending machine and incineration.
- 17. Green campus initiatives of the college includes the following: Pedestrian friendly pathways, landscaping with trees and plants, ban on use of plastic, no tobacco zone, restricted entry of automobiles in the college campus. Raha College received "Green and Clean Award 2020" from Anti-Global Warming Society. Morigaon in 2021.

Courses of Study

Regular Courses:

1. Two-year Higher Secondary (HS) Course in Arts:

Admission is given purely on merit and is subject to Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC) Regulations.

Seats: 700

Combination of Subjects:

- i. English and Environmental Education are compulsory subjects.
- ii. A Student shall select any one of the Modern Indian Language from Assamese and Hindi. A student shall select three/four elective subjects from the following list.
 With a maximum limit of 100 (one hundred) seats per subject
- a) Economics b) Education c) Political Science d) History e) Geography f) Logic & Philosophy g) Anthropology h) Sociology and i) Advance Assamese/ Advance Hindi/Sanskrit j) Swadesh Adhayan*

*Students offering Swadesh Adhayan in Higher Secondary level are eligible to pursue Honours course at UG level in Geography or History.

NEP-2020 (GU-FYUGP)

Introduction:

Govt. of Assam intends to roll out the implementation of NEP 2020 in Higher Education with effect from the academic session 2024-2025 in the State universities, Deemed to be University and Autonomous Colleges. It is envisaged that being multidisciplinary Institutions of higher learning that offers UG, PG and Ph. D. programmes, the

affiliating

Universities in the state will take the lead role by introducing Four Year Undergraduate Programme in its campuses in the ensuing academic session. They are also tasked to develop synergy among affiliated colleges for holistic implementation of the policy.

Each of

the Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) will integrate its academic plans ranging from curricular improvement to quality of classroom transaction and capacity building, into

Institutional Development Plans (IDP).

Structure of Year, Semester, Term:

An academic year is divided into two semesters. There shall also be a special Summer Term. A semester consists of approximately 90 working days

One working week will have approximately 40 hours of instructional time.

A Summer term is for eight weeks/two months from 01june -31July. Summer term courses may be offered on a fast-track mode to enable students to complete arrears/special courses.

(Note: Teachers can avail the summer vacation from 15 June-15July, devoting the first part of June for evaluation and the last part of July for preparatory work for the next academic session)

The HEI can decide on the kind of courses to be offered in the summer term, based on the requirements and also based on the availability of teaching faculty.

Internship/apprenticeship can be carried out during the summer term, mandatorily for student who exit after two semesters or four semesters of study in addition to the skill based courses

Semesters 1 and 2:

The aim of these courses is to develop an understanding in all major arcas of learning such as the Natural Sciences, Social Sciences, Humanities, Mathematical and computational thinking and analysis, creative expressions, and vocational education. The courses will be broad in scope, and introductory in nature.

In addition, students will also take courses in the Ability Enhancement (AEQ), Skill Enhancement (SEC) and Value Added (VAC) categories

Semester 3 and 4:

Students will choose courses of their interest in major and minor They will also pursue courses to strengthen their language skills and other skill augmenting courses/vocational training

Semester 5 and 6:

Higher level courses on the chosen Major and/or Minor in the disciplinary /interdisciplinary areas of learning in order to gain in-depth knowledge.

Students will also undertake vocational courses to gain work related skills

Semester 7 and 8:

Advance level courses in Major/Minor disciplines, along with Research Methodology, for UG degree with Honours.

For Honours with Research UG degree, course content will include advance level courses, research methodology and Research Project. Students may be allowed to carry out a research project or dissertation in another department of the same institution or another institution equipped with required facilities

Change of Major

HEIs may create additional 10% seats over and above the sanctioned strength to

accommodate the request for change of major at the end of the first year/3 Semester.

Programmes of study

UG Degree Programmes with Single Major:

A student has to secure a minimum of 50% credits from the major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a single major. For example, in a 3-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be carned is 120, a student of Physics with a minimum of 60 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. in Physics with a single major. Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be carned is 160, a student of Physics with a minimum of 80 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. (Hlons./Ion. With Research) in Physics in a 4-year UG programme with single major.

UG Degree Programmes with Double Major:

A student has to secure a minimum of 40% credits from the second major discipline for the 3-year/4-year UG degree to be awarded a double major. For example, in a 3-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be earned is 120, a student of Physics with a minimum of 48 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. in Physics with a double major. Similarly, in a 4-year UG programme, if the total number of credits to be earned is 160, a student of Physics with a minimum of 64 credits will be awarded a B.Sc. (ITons./Ilon. with Research) in Physics in a 4-year UG programme with double major.

Interdisciplinary UG Programmes:

The credits for core courses shall be distributed among the constituent disciplines /subjects so as to get core competence in the interdisciplinary programme. For example, a degree in Econometrics requires courses in economics, statistics, and mathematics. The total credits to core courses shall be distributed so that the student gets full competence in Econometrics upon completion of the programme. The degree for such students will be awarded as B.Sc. in Econometrics for a 3-year UG programme or B.Sc. (Honours) / B.Sc. (Honours with Research) in Econometrics for a 4-year UC programme.

Multidisciplinary UG Programmes:

In the case of students pursuing a multidisciplinary programme of study, the credits to core courses will be distributed among the broad disciplines such as Life sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical and Computer Sciences, Data Analysis, Social Science Humanities, etc, For example, a student who opts for a UG program in Life sciences have the total credits to core courses distributed across Botany, Zoology and biology disciplines. The degree will be awarded as B.Sc. in Life Sciences programme and B.Sc. (Honours) in Life Sciences or B.Sc. (Honours with Research) for a 4-year programme without or with a rescarch component respectively.

Note.

The statutory bodies of the Universities and Colleges such as the Board of Studies and Academic Council will decide on the list of courses under major category and credit distribution for double major, interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary programmes.

Duration of the Programme:

The duration of the UG programme is 4 years or 8 semesters. Students who desire to Undergo a 3-year UG Programme will be allowed to exit after completion of the 3rd year. Students who exit with a UG certificate or UG diploma are permitted to re-enter within three years and complete the degree programme. Students may be permitted to take a break from the study during the period of study but the total duration for completing the programme shall not exceed 7 years.

Exit at first year (Exit 1): UG Certificate

1. in addition to a minimum of 40 credit earned, the student will require to complete a mandatory 4 credit work based vocational course or internship/apprenticeship offered during summer term. This is in addition to the 6 credits from the skill based courses carned during first and second semester

2. Exit at second year (Exit 2): UG Diploma

In addition to a minimum of 80 credit earned, the student will require to complete a mandatory 4 credit work based vocational course or internship/apprenticeship offered during first year or second year summer term.

- 3. UG Degree in relevant discipline/subject will be awarded for those who pursue 3-year UG programme and secure 120 credits
- **4.** UG Degree, 4-Year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research) will be awarded if the student completes a rigorous research project of 12 credit in their major area(s) of study under the guidance of a faculty member. The students are expected to complete Research Project in the eighth semester. The research outcomes of their project may be published in peer-reviewed journals or may be presented in conferences /seminars or may be patented.
- 5. UG Degree(Honours) will be awarded on securing 160 credit by taking 12 credit advanced level (400 level) courses in lieu of Research Project/ Dissertation.

Credit hours for different types of courses

The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. A credit is a unit by which the coursework is measured. Tt determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum 15 weeks). Each course may have

- * lecture and tutorial component
- *lecture and practicum component
- *lecture, tutorial, and practicum component,
- * only practicum component

One credit for tutorial work means one hour of engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks' duration, a one-credit tutorial in a course is equivalent to 15 hours of engagement.

A one-credit course in practicum or lab work, community engagement and services, and fieldwork in a semester mean two-hour engagement per week. In a semester of 15 weeks' duration, a one-credit practicum in a course is equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A one credit of Seminar or Internship or Studio activities or Field practice/projects or Community engagement and service means two-hour engagements per week.

Accordingly, in a semester of 15 weeks' duration, one credit in these courses is Equivalent to 30 hours of engagement.

A course can have a combination of lecture credits, tutorial credits, and practicum credits. For example, a 4-credit course with three credits assigned for lectures and one credit for practicum shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 2-hour duration field-based learning / project or lab work, or workshop activities per week.

In a semester of 15 weeks' duration, a 4-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 30 hours of practicum. Similarly, a 4—credit course with 3- credits assigned for lectures and one credit for tutorial shall have three 1-hour lectures per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. In a semester of 15 weeks' duration, a four-credit course is equivalent to 45 hours of lectures and 15 hours of tutorials

Admission requirement and lateral entry:

Admission at both UG and PG level will be based on the Common University Entrance Test (CUET) conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA) and reservation

Guidelines of the Govt. of Assam to be followed.

A minimum CGPA of 7.5 may be considered for entry into the Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research.

However, minimum CGPA requirement for entry into the Bachelor's Degree with Honours may be decided by concerned Universities Autonomous Colleges.

Entry may be allowed at the beginning of the odd semester and exit allowed after the even semester. The quantum of lateral entry to be allowed at different levels will be decided by the respective HEls.

Admission to the FYUGP will be based on allotment of subjects leading to Major at the first semester with an option to change Major subject in 3 Semester after completion of first year subject to availability in the respective HEIs.

Admission Procedure

- 1. Admission is made strictly on the basis of merit and is governed by College Admission Rules. The decision of the Admission Committee regarding admission is final.
- 2. Any pressure or interference from any quarter for the admission of a particular student will result in forfeiture of the claim.

- 3. Candidates are required to produce the original copies of the following at the time of admission:
- (a) Mark sheet of the qualifying examination
- (b) Age Certificate
- (c) Character Certificate from the Head of the Institution last attended and
- (d) Caste certificate

Students passing the qualifying examination earlier than the current year will have to submit a gap certificate from the Head of the Institution last attended.

- 4. There is a provision for reservation of seats as per Govt. of Assam rules and in this respect caste certificate issued by competent authority under Govt. of Assam shall be valid.
- 5. There is a provision for reservation of seats for students having competence in extracurricular activities.

Attendance Rules

- Students who do not attend 75% of the total number of classes held in one academic session/one semester will not be allowed to appear in the final examination.
- Students who fail to attend their classes for a certain period of time on genuine and acceptable grounds must apply in writing to the Head of the Department concerned for consideration of exemption of the absence for the period, immediately after absence.

Maintenance of Discipline

- The courses of studies in the College are full time courses. No student can take any other full time course simultaneously.
